Vision: A community where children thrive, educators are valued, and families are supported.

Mission: PACCC partners with families and regional agencies to provide and advocate for exceptional and accessible childhood care and education.

Addition of Enrichment Programs

for ALL at Infant-Toddler & Preschool Centers

Enrichment programs are an essential component in preparing young learners for school readiness. During 2024, PACCC invested in providing enrichment programs for all students in our infant-toddler and preschool centers at no additional cost to our families.

PACCC partnered with **Golden Acorn Music** to offer weekly music and movement enrichment classes at our infant-toddler and preschool centers. Golden Acorn Music specializes in bringing high-quality music programs to Bay Area preschools and libraries by delivering weekly curriculum directly to the children and teachers. Golden Acorn Music teachers engage with the children through songs, stories, movement and musical instruments while collaborating with the PACCC classroom educators.

PACCC preschool centers (where outdoor space allows) partnered with Las Americas Futbol to offer soccer classes to all of our preschool students at no additional cost to families! For more than ten years, Coach Jaime has been using soccer to teach PACCC children the importance of teamwork, exercise and self-confidence. During each Las Americas Futbol class, the children participate in soccer drills, conditioning drills and a scrimmage game.

According to the Santa Clara County School Readiness: Fall Assessment Findings 2023 Report, the third most important asset for children's readiness for kindergarten is Family Use of Community Resources.

Regarding the readiness of families and communities to support child development and readiness outcomes, parents/caregivers rated their top family concerns:

of families reported they were not able to find enough engaging activities for their child.

This was rated as the second highest concern for families.

Parents/caregivers were also asked whether they had ever used multiple types of local family resources: 54% reported having access to recreational activities and 21% reported having access to arts/music programs.

To boost family support and enhance school readiness, families and teachers in the study recommended helping families pay for enriching activities.

Building the Early Childhood Education (ECE) Workforce

In alignment with our Strategic Plan goal to strengthen PACCC's reputation as the employer of choice for educators through competitive total compensation, enriched professional development opportunities, and enhanced staff engagement strategies, PACCC is investing in the Early Childhood Education workforce in some new and exciting ways.

PACCC has partnered with Palo Alto Unified School District's Career Technical Education Child Development Pathway Program and First 5's Child Development Apprenticeship Program to provide vital on-the-job training and mentorship in companionship with free college coursework to engage the next generation of early educators.

Participants receive one to two years of hands-on experience working directly with children, families and educators in addition to individualized coaching, professional development, as well as free education, books, tutoring, peer support and more!

The demand for early childhood educators is expected to grow in the coming years. This is due to an increase in birth rates and student population, a greater recognition of the value of early education, and the need to replace workers who retire or leave the workforce.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that employment of preschool teachers will grow 4% from 2023 to 2033.





Strategic Plan IN ACTION

Last year, PACCC shared our long-range Strategic Plan.

When constructing the plan, we dreamed big and understood the outcomes would need a multi-phased approach.

The sequence of phases is designed to be a reflection of their importance, while also presenting a strategic approach to resource management, capacity building, and adaptation to change. Phasing means prioritizing certain goals at specific times and making these goals the primary focus of the organization's policy and practice in its appropriate time or stage. Each phase builds on the previous one, starting with foundational elements including Leadership Positioning and Financial Support for Families in Phase 1, progressing to Expanding Resource Hubs in Phase 2, and Refining Facilities, Technology, and Community-wide Projects in Phase 3.



Strategic Plan cont'd

Phasing of the goals means that during that phase the goal becomes PACCC's priority at a systemic level. Here's why this approach is crucial:

- Phase I serves as the foundational stage that paves the way for the subsequent phases, creating a logical progression toward achieving our long-term goals. Phase I addresses immediate priorities by positioning PACCC as a leader in educational transitions, enhancing financial support for families, and strengthening organizational leadership. These actions set the stage for Phase 2.
- Phase 2 builds upon our initial successes. Phase 2 focuses on expanding our reputation as an employer of choice, developing an inclusion program, and launching a resource hub for families. The expertise gained, coupled with our strengthened foundation, then positions us to take on Phase 3.
- Phase 3 refines our facilities and technology infrastructure, invites youth and family partners to participate in programming, and initiates community wide projects.




