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A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear PACCC Supporters,

Each day at PACCC we imagine a future where *every child reaches their full potential; teachers are valued; and families are supported in raising their children*. Our vision for a better world is our guiding North Star, leading us in the right direction and bringing us closer to our hopes and dreams for children, families, and the community we serve. It's a tremendous responsibility to nurture the lives of young children while supporting the needs of working families and we take that responsibility seriously.

The field of early childhood development has come a long way since I first began my professional journey back in the mid-1980's. In that time research in the field has shown that the first five years of a child's life are critical to their development, learning and future success. We also know that benefits children gain in the early years must be sustained and nurtured as they grow and mature. PACCC's 19 infant, toddler, preschool and school-age child care and education programs are specifically designed to nurture children's optimal development from birth through 5th grade. For over 40 years PACCC has quietly and consistently provided this care to our community, but the time has come to make some noise.

Our mission as a community leader in Palo Alto is to partner with parents and regional agencies to provide quality, professional and accessible care and education. It is becoming increasingly difficult to meet that mission as the cost of living continues to climb in our area and staff and families are unable to afford to live here. It is a problem that our community must pay attention to and find solutions for before vital community members are lost.

PACCC is at a crossroads. We are faced with three major issues that make providing critical child care and education services extremely difficult without community support: **Affordability and Accessibility** for families, **Recruitment and Retention** of quality staff, and serving low-income working families through **The Family Partnership Program**. These interrelated issues create tension within our mission of providing high quality and accessible care. We cannot provide high quality child care and education without recruiting and retaining excellent staff who can fulfill that mission. We cannot remain accessible to all families without maintaining reasonable tuition fees and offering assistance to low-income families.

Over my 24 years at PACCC and living in Palo Alto I have watched educators move farther and farther away or leave the field of education. I hear countless stories of families leaving the area due to the unlikelihood of being able to set down solid roots. As a community, we have a choice. We can say "that's just the way it is" or we can commit resources to ensuring that our families and educators can remain here to create a vibrant, diverse community and provide critical services that every community needs to thrive.

The vitality of a community is directly linked to how that community values and supports families. No community can continue to flourish without offering families the resources and support-systems that help them to thrive. A family-focused community ensures a strong, sustainable future. As the largest provider of child care and education services in Palo Alto, PACCC plays a critical role in that sustainability.

At PACCC, we remain steadfastly focused on our vision of a world where *every child reaches their full potential, teachers are valued, and families are supported in raising their children*. It is a vision that takes a community of supporters like you to bring to reality. We greatly value and appreciate every family, every donor, every volunteer and every community partner who shares our vision and supports our work. We call on you to make some noise on behalf of the children, families and educators who need us. We quite literally cannot do it without you.

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A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR



Let's begin at the beginning.

We used to think that children were not ready to learn until they could sit still, listen to a teacher, follow directions and memorize. We now know that from birth and even before, all children are engaged in active learning, in making sense of the world. In fact, the learning done by the youngest infants as they gaze into a parent's eyes begins the process of creating their learning infrastructure, the pathways and connections within the brain that determines the capacity for learning. It is their interactions with caregivers and their environment that play such a large role in the quality of this brain architecture and their ability to learn throughout their lives.

A child's experience between birth and entry into elementary school matters. Quality early childhood experiences can make the difference between taking advantage of formal schooling and arriving at Kindergarten set up to fail. Responsive caregiving environments that provide many and varied age appropriate experiences go a long way toward enabling children to take advantage of all the learning opportunities schools provide. Conversely, when a child's first years are confined by poverty and other stressors that deprive them of these interactions and environments, they arrive at kindergarten without the brain architecture necessary to succeed in school. They are set up to fail.

PACCC programs are designed to support excellent brain development. Responsive and caring interactions provided by our wonderful educators nurture positive relationships with children. Appropriately stimulating environments with many opportunities for exploration of the world ensure the children in our programs thrive. Not only do PACCC programs include an environment rich in vocabulary, conversation, print, and exploration of all kinds of situations, they also include supporting the development of social-emotional skills, equally important for successful learning. Our educators play a critical role in setting children up for success. Through the provision of excellent opportunities for well-rounded social-emotional and cognitive development and learning both before children enter Kindergarten as well as during their elementary years, PACCC's 19 programs are a critical part of our communities' education network.

Palo Alto Unified School District (PAUSD) has for years suffered an achievement gap between the success levels of children from well-resourced families that can provide excellent early childhood programs to their children and families whose life circumstances prevent them from providing their children with the same advantages. This plays a large part in PAUSD's achievement gap. Part of PACCC's mission is to make sure that our programs are available to a wide range of children so that all arrive at Kindergarten ready and eager to succeed. Our after-school programs continue to support all their skills throughout the elementary years so they can continue to succeed, thus significantly decreasing the achievement gap.

Our partnership and collaboration with PAUSD is critical to the effort to reduce the achievement gap that exists in our schools. Over the past year the PACCC Board and leadership have worked with PAUSD to improve our ability to administer their contract with the State of California that supports tuition for children whose families cannot afford the full cost of our early childhood programs. We have worked closely with the city of Palo Alto to combine the funds they provide for the same kind of subsidies to broaden access to our excellent programs making sure they are inclusive, prepare children to arrive at Kindergarten ready for success and support that success throughout their school years.

Strengthening our partnerships with PAUSD and the City of Palo Alto is a high priority. It has been both productive for the community and rewarding for PACCC. Our focus over the past year has been to play an ever more energetic and dynamic role in deepening and strengthening the education web of support available to families and children in Palo Alto. The progress in becoming more integrated into our community's education system is evident. We will continue to work with others on improving this web of support over the coming year in order to contribute to the healthy development of the community's children in pursuit of our vision of a future where *every child reaches his/her full potential; teachers are valued; and families are supported in raising their children.*

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Importance of PACCC's Valued Educators

For PACCC to continue to reach toward its vision of *a future where every child reaches his/her full potential; teachers are valued; and families are supported in raising their children*, we need to continue to focus on the dedicated staff working at the center of that vision in all 19 of our child care and education programs. The valued educators who care for the children and support the families each day in our centers need to feel supported and valued by their organization. They need to know that PACCC supports their ongoing personal and professional development and well-being. These must be among our highest organizational priorities.

Teachers are one of the most susceptible groups of professionals for burnout if they do not attend to their personal and professional needs. To do good work, our educators must stop and think of their own needs, desires, and interests on an ongoing basis. They must be involved in self-care and wellness practices as well as continual professional and personal development, attending to their own energy, well-being, and growth. Without these practices, staff can easily fall into burnout and stagnation in the classroom.

FAMILY PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

For over 40 years, Palo Alto Community Child Care has fulfilled its mission of delivering accessible, quality child care to infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and school-age children throughout the mid-peninsula region. In 1974, PACCC partnered with the City of Palo Alto to offer subsidized child care to low-income families. The community need for financial aid continued to grow, and in 2001 PACCC partnered with Palo Alto Unified School District (PAUSD) to manage their State of California child development contract. Since that time PACCC has served over 2,300 children in need utilizing funding from the State, City and PACCC's own resources. In 2012 PACCC's financial aid program was renamed The Family Partnership Program.

The Family Partnership Program is an integral part of PACCC's Mission, Vision, and Values. What goes into operating a quality program like this? Let's take a deeper look behind the scenes of PACCC's Family Partnership Program.

What is the Family Partnership Program?

There is a vast need for safe, affordable, high quality child care for all families living in the mid-peninsula region, including our neighbors with low incomes. The Family Partnership Program is a financial aid program that provides these families the necessary child care services to enroll in quality PACCC programs, so that each child and their family as a whole can achieve success and reach their full potential.

What does research tell us about quality child care and education programs?

Research shows quality childhood and educational programs such as PACCC's provide a nurturing environment where early learning experiences and physical health greatly impact a child's future success. Each PACCC program allows children to learn, play and grow in a safe environment. Children of all ages gain skills that build trusting relationships, focus on self-control, perspective taking, self-sufficiency, critical thinking, and self-directed, engaged learning. Quality programs directly influence a child's cognitive, social, physical, and emotional development.

Research also shows that families not enrolled in quality care and education programs are at risk. Disadvantaged families are least likely to have the economic and social resources to provide the early developmental stimulation every child needs for future success in school, college, career and life. Lack of access to quality early learning environments can be traced to low levels of cognitive and social-emotional skills such as attentiveness, persistence, and working well with others. The results of

The results of a child not enrolled in a high-quality program like PACCC's directly influences the economy by being linked to a higher risk of poor health, lower-levels of education, poverty, and risky behaviors often leading to crime.

What makes a family eligible?

All families receiving assistance for child care and education services must meet extensive State and City eligibility requirements. Each family must provide the necessary documentation to show proof of eligibility and need. Of the 100 plus currently enrolled children who receive subsidies under PACCC's Family Partnership Program, 90% come from working families who would be unable to afford quality child care without the help of financial aid. 4% are in an educational or training program, 2% are working and in an educational program, and 4% are special circumstances (referred by Child Protective Services, disabled, homeless, or other).

Where does the funding come from?

There is a variety of funding sources that support The Family Partnership Program. PACCC subcontracts with PAUSD to manage their State of California child development contract. PACCC also has established a lengthy partnership with The City of Palo Alto to provide these fundamental child care services to residents of Palo Alto. In addition, PACCC receives generous donations from foundations, individuals and community-wide fundraising events. The growth in funding must match the growth in costs to continue high quality programs; and therefore, PACCC must continue to fundraise necessary dollars to help sustain The Family Partnership Program.



FAMILY PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Cipriana Morin Ramos, PACCC's Financial Aid Coordinator, is the backbone of The Family Partnership Program. She does so much more than manage the financials and administrative record keeping. Each family that walks through Cipriana's office has a story to share and often times their story is heavy-hearted; each family has a need or a reason as to why they come seeking assistance for child care. For Cipriana, the work is deeply personal. In many instances, Cipriana is a child and family advocate and advisor, court mediator, and resource specialist to each of the inquiring, incoming, and enrolled families. Families want to continue to work or further their education, but can't afford child care while working to support their family. She serves all families and children with such integrity and purpose, wanting to make sure that no family leaves her office without a sense of hope and dignity.

Cipriana came to PACCC in 2015 and in this short amount of time she has connected with hundreds of families on a deep level. She is the person who gets to say yes to families in need; families that work, go to school, or might have a special circumstance. She knows the challenges families face and is their voice at City and State meetings. She keeps up with community wide resources and participates in educational leadership trainings in order to progress and continue to cultivate The Family Partnership Program; specifically addressing our community's needs. She has recently worked with several organizations such as Youth Community Service and DreamCatchers to connect graduating families to ongoing early intervention services, a critical step to closing the achievement gap for these children. Cipriana recognizes the importance of caring for our community's children and supporting their families. She will continue working with due diligence to make quality care and education accessible to families of all income levels.

PACCC Partners with Stanford and PAUSD

Access to quality after-school child care and education services is essential for working parents with elementary school-aged children. Unfortunately, the demand for care exceeds available space. Through a partnership with Stanford, PAUSD and PACCC, a second portable classroom was installed at Escondido Elementary School during summer 2017 to help meet the high demand for after-school care at the site. PACCC is grateful to Stanford for providing the funding for the much needed expansion and to PAUSD for coordinating installation of the modular classroom. PACCC began serving an additional 20 children at Escondido Kids' Club (EKC) shortly after the start of the new school year and we look forward to serving more children for years to come!



New Preschool Playground in the Works!

In April 2017 the Palo Alto Weekly Holiday Fund awarded a generous grant to PACCC to help in the purchase of a new, ADA accessible play structure area at College Terrace Children's Center (CTC). Since that time our plans for the space have gone through multiple design phases to finally achieve the space we desire. The playground materials have been ordered and we will soon break ground on this exciting project.

We are so grateful to the Palo Alto Weekly Holiday Fund for recognizing the need for high quality, ADA accessible and safe outdoor spaces for children to develop critical large motor skills. Our new space is sure to challenge and engage children's minds and bodies and bring many years of fun to the hundreds of children who will benefit from this project.
